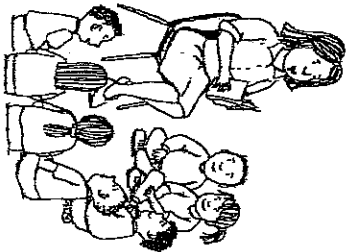


Who We Are:

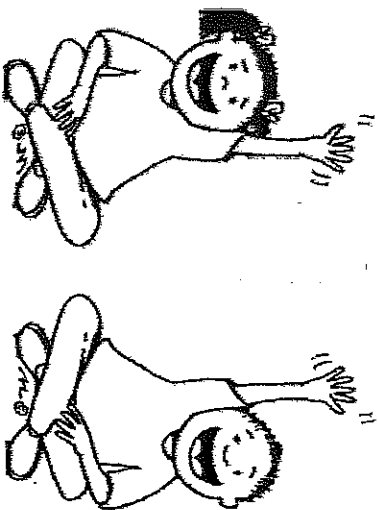

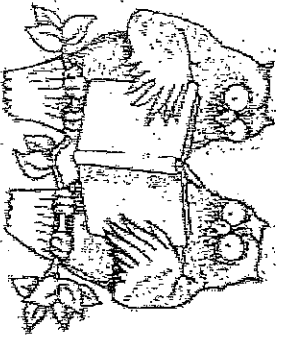

What is Title I?



The Title I program is funded by the federal government to provide additional support to children who may be struggling with learning to read and write.

At Canadochly Elementary School we serve children in Kindergarten through fifth grade. The Title I teachers and assistant work both in and out of the classrooms. We work with the children individually or in small groups to support what is being taught in the classroom.

Title I teachers also work with reading/writing intervention groups as needed.

May Have:

Why is my child in Title I?

Students are selected on the basis of the spring assessment scores. Students entering Kindergarten are selected in the fall after AIMSweb testing is complete.

Students entering first through third grades are selected based on their end-of-year testing scores on AIMSweb and the district writing assessment.

Students entering fourth and fifth grades are selected based on their end-of-year testing scores on AIMSweb, district writing assessment, and PSSA scores.

Assessment scores are reviewed at the end of each year to determine which students will be in the Title I program the following year.

What can I do to help my child?

There are many things that will help your child. Read to and with your child every



day. Show that reading is important by purchasing books as gifts or by going to the library together. Let your child see you reading magazines, books, or newspapers and writing notes, lists, or letters. Support the classroom teacher by checking homework and helping with homework as needed. Save negative comments about the school or teacher for when your child is out of hearing range.

What do you do with my child?

Title I teachers and aides work with small groups or individual children on reading or writing activities. These activities are planned by the Title I teacher, though sometimes the classroom teacher plans activities for us. We work mostly on reading strategies, word work, handwriting, and creative writing. The Title I teacher may grade work done by the students, but the classroom teacher is responsible for report card grades and comments. However, you will receive a progress report from the Title I teachers each marking period.
